# **2021 ANNUAL REPORT**

A funny thing happened on the way to 2022.

Thanks to COVID-19, IJNR conducted all its 2021 programs virtually – not our preferred MO. But we tend to be glass-half-full types, and we couldn't help noticing that shorter virtual programs came with some side benefits. Sure, we had nine of them, up from our usual 3-5. More programs meant more participants – more than 250 journalists joined IJNR programs in 2021, double our usual reach. And thanks to our generous funders, those virtual programs were enhanced by reporting grants: IJNR gave away roughly \$40,000 to get stories told in 2021.

Perhaps more importantly, those programs attracted folks we couldn't always reach. Moms (and dads) with

kids at home. Young people who didn't have the resources to reach our starting point. Journalists of color who looked at IJNR's materials and didn't see themselves represented.

But our virtual existence only required attendees to log in, where they found the dozens of experts that IJNR is still pretty good at assembling. Thus, the IJNR fam-

ily grew, both quantitatively and qualitatively, and we're looking forward to seeing new faces when we go back on the road in 2022. We'll start small – there is, after all, a pandemic still happening – but it will be great to get back to doing what we do best.

So here's hoping we see you – in real life – soon!







# **PFAS: A Virtual Workshop for Journalists**

## January 27-28

Journalists heard from experts from across the country who have worked to better understand the impact of PFAS, aka "forever chemicals," track their movement through the environment and human bodies, and rein in their use.

# Topics included:

- Public health officials, scientists and resource managers spoke about tackling the problem.
- Stories of community activists who have been impacted by chemical toxicity directy.
- Ways PFAS chemicals have been used in military, manufacturing, and life-protection activities and how those uses have led to their proliferation in community drinking water and food - leading to an estimated 99% of Americans having measurable levels of PFAS in their blood.

# **Covering Environmental Racism: A Workshop for Editors**

#### March 3

IJNR held a five-hour workshop for editors, to explore questions of environmental racism, social equity and the problematic lenses through which these stories get told.

Editors had an opportunity to:

- Talk with researchers and activists about the ways editorial decisions, word choices and story framing have exacerbated inequities.
- Learn how historic race-based housing discrimination shaped U.S. cities and led to many of our current environmental injustices.
- Explore what coverage of the Flint Water Crisis revealed about journalism's strengths and weaknesses.
- Hear from the editorial team of the *Kansas City Star* the genesis of the paper's unprecedented apology to the city's Black citizens, and how that apology has informed changes in the newsroom.
- Meet citizen activists who have been working for decades to push for equity and protect public health.
- Explore journalism's role in perpetuating stereotypes and minimizing the voices of communities of color.




